Jesus (God's Son)

It's hard to describe Jesus better than the writer Paul:

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For by him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things were created by him and for him. He is before all things, and in him all things hold together.

However Philip Schaff did a pretty good job as well:

Jesus of Nazareth, without money and arms, conquered more millions than Alexander the Great, Caesar, Mohammed, and Napoleon; without science and learning, he shed more light on things human and divine than all philosophers and scholars combined; without the eloquence of school, he spoke such words of life as were never spoken before or since, and produced effects which lie beyond the reach of orator or poet; without writing a single line, he set more pens in motion, and furnished themes for more sermons, orations, discussions, learned volumes, works of art, and songs of praise than the whole army of great men of ancient and modern times.

We believe that Jesus was genitum non factum (begotten not made). Or as Athanasias said, "same substance of God" (Isaiah 7:14; 53; Matthew 1:18-23; 3:17; 8:29; 14:33; 16:16; 28:56; Luke 22:70; 24:46-47; John 1:1, 14; 10:30; 11:25-27; 17:15; Acts 1:9; 2:22-24; 7:55-56; Romans 1:34; 3:23-26; 8:13; 10:4; 1 Corinthians 8:6; 2 Corinthians 5:19-21; Gal 4:45; Philippians 2:5-11; Colossians 1:15; 2:9; 1 Timothy 2:56; 3:16)

The blood of Jesus Christ, which was spilled seven times in the process of his death, providesthe only way of salvation through the forgiveness of sin.
